The earliest known recording of this song was in 1922 under the title Dis Train. In 1935 the first hillbilly recording of the song was released by Tennessee Ramblers as "Dis Train" in reference to the song's black roots. In the late 1930s, after becoming the first black artist to sign with a major label, gospel singer and guitarist Sister Rosetta Tharpe recorded "This Train" as a hit for Decca. Her later version of the song, released in the early 1950s, featured Tharpe on electric guitar and is cited as one of several examples of her work that led to the emergence of rock 'n roll.
