Pat Boone's version became a major hit in June and July 1957, spending 5 weeks at number one on the Billboard Top 100. Billboard ranked it as the No. 2 song for 1957. Boone did the whistling in the instrumental portion of the song, as well. The song was also used in Pat Boone's film Bernardine.
